• 640-099 Lion Brand Wool-Ease Thick & Ouick Yarn: Fisherman 15 Balls

• Knitting Needles- Size 13 [9 mm]

• Cable Needles (Set of 2)

<u>Large-Eye Blunt Needles (Set of 6)</u> Wool; 8% Rayon;

 Additional Materials Crochet hook, size M-13 (9 mm) for oz./170g (106 yd/97 m) adding fringe

*Wool-Ease Thick & Quick (Article #640). Solids, Heathers, Twists, Prints, Stripes: 80% Acrylic, 20% Wool:

Wheat & Wood: 86% Acrylic; 10% Wool; 4% Rayon; Oatmeal & Barley & Grey Marble: 82% Acrylic; 10%

Metallics: 79% Acrylic, 20% Wool, 1% Metallic Poly; package size: Solids, Heathers, Twists, Tweeds: 6

Prints, Stripes: 5 oz./140g (87 yd/80 m) Metallics: 5 oz./140g (92 yd/84 m)



GAUGE:

9 sts + 12 rows = 4 in. (10 cm) in Stockinette st (k on RS, p on WS). Multiple stitch patterns are used on the Afghan, but work your swatch in Stockinette st. When you match the gauge given, the gauge of your stitch patterns should work as well.

When you match the gauge in a pattern, your project will be the size specified in the pattern and the materials specified in the pattern will be sufficient. The needle or hook size called for in the pattern is based on what the designer used, but it is not unusual for gauge to vary from person to person. If it takes you fewer stitches and rows to make your swatch, try using a smaller size hook or needles; if more stitches and rows, try a larger size hook or needles.

Making a Gauge Swatch

STITCH EXPLANATION:

1/1 LC (1 over 1 left cross) Slip 1 st to cable needle and hold in front, k1, then k1 from cable needle. 1/1 RC (1 over 1 right cross) Slip 1 st to cable needle and hold in back, k1, then k1 from cable needle. 2/1 LC (2 over 1 left cross) Slip 2 sts to cable needle and hold in front, k1, then k2 from cable needle. 2/1 RC (2 over 1 right cross) Slip 1 st to cable needle and hold in back, k2, then k1 from cable needle. 2/2 LC (2 over 2 left cross) Slip 2 sts to cable needle and hold in front, k2, then k2 from cable needle. 2/2 RC (2 over 2 right cross) Slip 2 sts to cable needle and hold in back, k2, then k2 from cable needle.

NOTES:

- 1. Afghan is worked in 12 separate Blocks and 2 Border pieces.
- 2. The pieces are sewn together following a diagram.
- 3. Fringe is added to assembled Afghan.

BLOCK I (make 4)

Cast on 21 sts.

Row 1 (RS): K1, (p1, k1) 10 times.

Row 2: P1, (k1, p1) 10 times.

Rows 3-16: Rep Rows 1 and 2 seven times.

Row 17: K1, p2, k6, p3, k6, p2, k1.

Row 18: P1, k2, p6, k3, p6, k2, p1.

Row 19: K1, p2, 2/2 LC, k2, p3, 2/2 LC, k2, p2, k1.


Rows 20 and 22: P1, k2, p6, k3, p6, k2, p1.

Row 21: K1, p2, k2, 2/2 LC, p3, k2, 2/2 LC, p2, k1.

Rows 23-34: Rep Rows 19-22 three more times.

Rows 35-68: Rep Rows 1-34. **Rows 69-84:** Rep Rows 1-16.

Bind off, working Row 1 as you bind off.



Stitch Key

= K on RS, p on WS

= P on RS, k on WS

= 1/1 RC

= 2/1 LC

= 2/1 RC

= 2/2 LC

= 2/2 RC

BLOCK II (make 4)

Cast on 38 sts.

Row 1 (RS): K1, p1, 2/2 RC, 2/2 LC, p4, 2/1 RC, k4, 2/1 LC, p4, 2/2 RC, 2/2 LC, p1, k1.

Rows 2 and 4: P1, k1, p8, k4, p2, k6, p2, k4, p8, k1, p1.

Row 3: K1, p1, k8, p4, k10, p4, k8, p1, k1.

Row 5: K1, p1, 2/2 RC, 2/2 LC, p4, 2/1 LC, k4, 2/1 RC, p4, 2/2 RC, 2/2 LC, p1, k1.

Rows 6 and 8: P1, k1, (p8, k5) twice, p8, k1, p1.

Row 7: K1, p1, (k8, p5) twice, k8, p1, k1.

Row 9: K1, 2/1 RC, k4, 2/1 LC, p4, 2/2 RC, 2/2 LC, p4, 2/1 RC, k4, 2/1 LC, k1.

Rows 10 and 12: P3, k6, p2, k4, p8, k4, p2, k6, p3.

Row 11: K11, p4, k8, p4, k11.

Row 13: K1, 2/1 LC, k4, 2/1 RC, p4, 2/2 RC, 2/2 LC, p4, 2/1 LC, k4, 2/1 RC, k1.


Row 14: P1, k1, (p8, k5) twice, p8, k1, p1.

Row 15: K1, p1, (k8, p5) twice, k8, p1, k1.

Row 16: Rep Row 14.

Rows 17-64: Rep Rows 1-16 three times.

Bind off.



BLOCK III (make 4)

Cast on 30 sts.

Row 1 (RS): K1, (1/1 RC, 1/1 LC) 7 times, k1.


Row 2: Purl.

Row 3: K1, (1/1 LC, 1/1 RC) 7 times, k1.

Row 4: Purl.

Rows 5-52: Rep Rows 1-4 twelve times. **Rows 53 and 54:** Rep Rows 1 and 2.

Bind off.



BORDERS (make 2)

Cast on 9 sts.

Row 1: K1, (p1, k1) 4 times.


Row 2: P1, (k1, p1) 4 times.

Rep Rows 1 and 2 until piece measures 50 in. (127 cm) from beg, ending with a Row 2 as the last row you work. Bind off, working Row 1 as you bind off.

FINISHING

Following diagram and keeping seams on RS, sew Blocks together. Take care to change direction of Blocks as indicated by arrows on diagram. Sew Borders along each long side of Afghan.

Weave in ends.



Fringe

Note: The fringe on this Afghan is dramatically long. Make fringe length as desired.

For each fringe, cut 4 strands of yarn, each 40 in. (101.5 cm) long. Hold the 4 strands together and fold in half. With crochet hook, draw fold through edge of Afghan, forming a loop. Pull ends of fringe through this loop. Pull to tighten. Make fringe evenly spaced along each short side of Afghan. Make fringe along edges of Block III as shown on diagram.
